Steps to Create a Digitization Program:

- 1. Analysis: SWOT; determine goals & constraints.
- 2. Plan: your needs, the cost, sustainability, etc.
- 3. Implementation: plan of operation.
- 4. Evaluate.



My Plan...

- 1. Determine goals.
- 2. Research software/hardware options.
- 3. Determine standards.
- 4. Write procedures.
- 5. Create content and metadata.
- 6. Advertise.



"Simply serving useful digital collections effectively to a known constituency is not sufficient. Issues of cost/value, sustainability, and trust have emerged as critical success criteria for good digital collections. Objects, metadata, and collections must now be viewed not only within the context of the projects that created them, but as building blocks that others can reuse, repackage, repurpose, and build services upon. "Goodness" now demands interoperability, reusability, persistence, verification, documentation, and support for intellectual property rights."

Greenstone is a suite of software for building and distributing digital library collections. It provides a new way of organizing information and publishing it on the Internet or on CD-ROM. Greenstone is produced by the New Zealand Digital Library Project at the University of Waikato, and developed and distributed in cooperation with UNESCO and the Human Info NGO. It is open-source software, available from http://greenstone.org under the terms of the GNU General Public License.

The aim of the software is to empower users, particularly in universities, libraries, and other public service institutions, to build their own digital libraries. Digital libraries are radically reforming how information is disseminated and acquired in UNESCO's partner communities and institutions in the fields of education, science and culture around the world, and particularly in developing countries. We hope that this software will encourage the effective deployment of digital libraries to share information and place it in the public domain.

This software is developed and distributed as an international cooperative effort established in August 2000 among three parties.

New Zealand Digital Library Project at the University of Waikato

Greenstone software grew out of this project, and this initiative has been endorsed by the Communication Sub-Commission of the New Zealand National Commission for UNESCO as part of New Zealand's contribution to UNESCO's programme.

United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization

The dissemination of educational, scientific and cultural information throughout the world, and particularly its availability in developing countries, is central to UNESCO's goals as pursued within its intergovernmental Information for All Programme, and appropriate, accessible information and communication technology is seen as an important tool in this context.



About the collections

The South Texas School of Law opened in 1923, in downtown Houston, Organized by the Young Men's Christian Association in response to the need for adult education, it was one of twenty such law schools in the country. Houston in the 1920s was experiencing the explosive growth of the oil industry, which created a pressing need for lawyers to handle the business arising from the discovery, production, transportation, refining, and marketing of oil, The only accredited law schools in Texas at the time were The University of Texas in Austin and Baylor University in Waco, For over 85 years the mission of the school has remained simple; provide accessible legal education, distinguished by its excellence, to a diverse body of students committed to serving their communities and the profession.

Our digital collections intend to chronicle the history of the school, the legal history of the Houston area, and showcase the diverse holdings of the Fred Parks Law Library, including archival material, manuscript collections and rare books from our Special Collections Department.





Add collection

A CONTENTIAM collection consists of a set of files that are stored in a directory on the server. Creating a new collection entails creating a new directory and assigning permissions on the server.


After you add the collection, you need to edit the collection configuration settings to enable functionality such as full text searching, PDF file processing, and full resolution image format. Use the Website Configuration Tool to configure appearance and behavior of the collection display in the public interface.

Tip: Use short aliases to avoid browser limitations when searching across a large number of collections.
